- You could research the roles of solicitors and barristers if you are thinking of this as a career path.

### Recommended trips or visits this summer

If you are 16 or over you can visit your local Magistrates or Crown court to observe cases. You do not need to book this because most criminal cases are open to the public. This could give you a valuable insight into what happens in a real-life trial and the role of various legal professionals.

### Tasks to complete

- Keep an eye on the news – law students should have some knowledge of current affairs. Look out for any interesting cases, especially about criminal law.
- Get yourself a file for notes as well as a USB stick to save your assignments.
- Be ready to ask questions and develop your analytical and problem-solving skills – you'll find the course challenging but very rewarding!
